

# Overview of activity this quarter

The 2024-25 Island Plan sets out six redefined strategic priorities as agreed by the Council of Ministers that reflect not only our ambitions, but also recognise the financial pressures being applied to public finances. These six priorities underpin all of the work undertaken across Government. Over the past quarter, the following progress has been made.



### **Financial discipline**

- The focus for this quarter was to **implement** the 2024-25 budget with clear emphasis on ensuring fiscal constraint and that Departments operate within budget.
- At the end of the quarter all Departments have a plan in place to manage their budget, deliver efficiencies and cost reductions, and ensure they remain within their voted expenditure level.

### Economic development

- Registered unemployment fell to an **average** of 266 over the quarter.
- Hospitality support delivered to maximise income during TT.
- Fourth Brownfield site supported in principle by Island Infrastructure Scheme - stimulating a total of nearly **£90m** private sector leverage across all four sites.
- Delivered the 2024 Innovation Challenge with four winners who will now continue to work with the Isle of Man.

### Residency, migration and security

- Acknowledging challenges in immigration, additional resources were allocated, resulting in **significant reductions** in processing backlogs.
- Achieved the milestone in **securing entry points** and developed an implementation plan focusing on enhanced border control measures.
- On track to publish the **Inward Migration** Policy Report on the Register of Business in July, following consultation with Tynwald Members.

### Travel connectivity: Air & sea

- Progressed with **stakeholder consultation** towards bringing forward an **Air Services Policy** for July, to secure strategic links and approach for the future.
- The Sea Services Committee has continued to gather information, with all Departments having now provided input.

### More homes occupied

- Since June 2021 **604** new homes have already been built and currently there are **475** housing units with final planning approval ready for construction.
- Treasury, to discourage vacant properties, are exploring amendments to the Rating and Valuations Act 1953 with the Attorney General's Chambers.
- Planning application for Lord Street lodged, supported in principle by the Island Infrastructure Scheme.

#### Energy security: Including progress on offshore and onshore wind power generation

- Manx Utilities continues to work with the Treasury and DEFA (from an Energy Policy perspective) to understand and mitigate risks as far as possible and establish an appropriate funding route for **onshore renewables**, as well as the Energy Transition Programme as a whole.
- For **offshore renewables**, work continues to prepare the required secondary legislation, with the intention to progress this legislation to the July sitting of Tynwald.

A focus on each of these priorities continues to be applied across Government to ensure we are delivering key ambitions aligned to the Island Plan.

### Spotlight: Over 3,000 operations delivered in phase two of the Restoration and Recovery (R&R) Programme Click here to read more.

Over 3,000 operations have been delivered as part of the second phase of the Restoration and Recovery (R&R) Programme.

More than 847 patients had a hip or knee replaced, 1,794 had cataract operations and 515 had hernias repaired or gallbladders removed.

Since the Programme began in November 2021 a total of over 3,600 operations have now been delivered, over 1,900 diagnostic tests undertaken and more than 300 mental health referrals supported.

The £18.3 million second phase of the Programme focused on reducing waiting lists for orthopaedic (knee and hip), ophthalmic (cataracts) and general surgery procedures.

This was successful in all three areas, reducing the number of people waiting for an operation as well as the amount of time spent on the waiting list.

Between assessment and operation the average wait time for ophthalmology has been reduced by 33 weeks, for orthopaedics by 16 weeks and general surgery by 28 weeks.

#### Lawrie Hooper MHK, Minister for Health and Social Care, said:

'Our commitment to reducing hospital waiting lists is about more than the numbers in these reports, it's about transforming the lives of the patients that have had or are waiting for operations. By funding this initiative we've not only been able to treat more patients and address the immediate backlogs, but waiting lists will be significantly smaller with shorter waiting times – meaning the three areas targeted during phase two are far more resilient and sustainable going forward.'

### Spotlight: Winners of the 2024 Innovation Challenge announced

On Thursday 13 June, 13 businesses from across the globe presented cutting-edge solutions at the Isle of Man's Innovation Challenge Finale event at the Comis Hotel. The event hosted over 250 attendees across the day from the business community.

The winners for the Cleantech category were <u>Re-Universe</u> for their packaging return and reuse system. <u>Acentrik</u> (Mercedes-Benz) were the winners of the Data and Al category for their leading data exchange solution. <u>Umazi</u> were winners of the Fintech category with their solution designed to address challenges related to client data and on-boarding for businesses. The Biosphere winner was <u>4Learn</u> for their innovative PLAI software, which offers customised learning solutions in education.

Run by the Department for Enterprise's Executive Agencies—Digital Isle of Man, Business Isle of Man, and Finance Isle of Man—with the support of the Isle of Man Financial Services Authority and UNESCO Biosphere, the initiative aimed to help businesses scale up their operations and expand into new markets.

The winners in each category will now receive additional promotion and publicity both locally and internationally. They will also have extended access to the Isle of Man's marketplace of mentors, potential investors, and customers across various sectors, regulators, and government officers for six months.

### Spotlight: Additional protection for Isle of Man fishing grounds

Three important fishing sites in Manx waters have received greater protection after decisive action from the Department of Environment, Food and Agriculture.

The ban on bottom trawling in the areas will allow for the development of a new, sustainable and potentially lucrative langoustine fishery, using low-impact methods.

It follows the UK's awarding of 100 tonne langoustine quota, which if utilised, could more than double by 2026.

The new measures will also protect numerous vulnerable species, internationally important habitats and rich carbon deposits.

The ban will remain in place until December 2026, when research into blue carbon and seabed habitats has been complete and a review of the trial fishery will take place.



#### Jack Emmerson, Sea Fisheries Manager at DEFA, said:

'The new quota is a massive opportunity for the Manx seafood industry and we're committed to ensuring the new fishery is established with sustainability at its foundation.'


