




Background

The Isle of Man's ageing population is growing and will continue to do so over the next 15-20 years

Leads to increased demand and cost of providing long term care















Nursing, Residential and Home Care Project

How should the Island pay for the long term care needs of the population?

- Long term care includes care in a care home (residential or nursing home) or receiving care in your own home if you need help with activities that are a normal part of daily living
- Government is looking at 2 different models that will be developed in detail













Current position

- Majority of the cost is paid for by individuals and their families at the time that a family member needs care
- Only people who are eligible for income support get state support towards their costs
- For care provided at home, there is a 'cliff edge' created by the current system
 - Those that are eligible for income support get their care provided for free
 - Everyone else gets no help with the cost of care at home













Objective and principles for the change

Objective: Achieve a **fair** and **sustainable** system for paying for care

Fairness

Treat everyone the same?

To service user or tax payer?

Too rich or poor?

Required to use assets?

Intergenerational



Sustainability

Future adaptability

Long term affordability

Stable basis for planning

Supported by efficient care provision

Principles:

- Increased asset protection for the individual receiving care
- Government (wider society) will bear an increased cost













Preferred models

Free personal care:

- Personal care is provided to people at no charge at the point of use, regardless of their income/assets or care setting.
- NHS type model

Mixed model:

- Bespoke model focussed on providing more financial support for everyone's care needs, although people with more means are required to pay towards their care before the become eligible for support.
- Designed to protect more of people's assets.



Both models require people to meet their own accommodation and living costs, with means tested support available to those who cannot afford those costs











Free personal care

Summary

- Free personal care is provided at the point of use regardless of a person's level of income or assets
- Includes tasks of a personal nature (relating to hygiene, medication, feeding, bathing, dressing)
- Other care (e.g. shopping/cleaning), accommodation and daily living costs are paid for by the individual but support is available on a means tested basis through income support benefits













Mixed model

Summary

- Introduce a new benefit that covers care costs for everyone that needs help with personal care
- There is a waiting period for those with assets above a certain level (i.e. a 'capital threshold'). The period is dependent on a max. amount (i.e. a 'cap') that a person has to pay towards care costs
- Means tested support is available from day one for those with funds under a defined capital threshold
- Accommodation and daily living costs are paid for by the individual but support is available on a means tested basis













Mixed model

Summary

Do you own assets over £threshold amount *?

No

You will get some help towards your care and support costs straight away

Yes

You will need to meet your own care and support costs for a period (between 1 – 3 years) and then you will get some help towards them.

* The actual threshold will be determined following public engagement – a suggested range will be tested as part of the engagement














Comparative cost split







